

Brief Bio: Dr. Cathleen Norris, 2003 I nvited Speaker

Dr. Cathleen A. Norris is a Professor in the Department of Technology and Cognition at the University of North Texas (Norris@unt.edu). Dr. Norris' efforts in research, teaching and service all have a common focus: integrating learning technologies more effectively into classrooms, K-12 as well as post-secondary education. In the Snapshot Survey Project, Dr. Norris surveyed educators around the country to better understand their use of, beliefs about, and needs for technology in the classroom (http://snapshotsurvey.org). Dr. Norris is exploring design guidelines that address the unique needs of children in the WebKids and FindResearch Projects. She has also developed strategies to help educators extract value from the research literature on technology in education. Dr. Norris is currently the co-President of ISTE, the International Society for Technology in Education (http://www.iste.org).

Janet Ray, UNT, Receives Award for the Outstanding Graduate Student Paper

Janet Ray, a doctoral student in Curriculum and Instruction at the University of North Texas, received a certificate and \$200 for the Outstanding Graduate Student Paper Award at the 2002 conference luncheon. A brief abstract of her paper, Meta-Analytic Thinking: Using ESCI to Synthesize Effects Across Studies, follows:

The practical significance, usefulness, and generalizability of research has for decades hinged on a finding of statistical significance. Voices of reform have called for the use of effect sizes, confidence intervals, and meta-analytic synthesis of research as a way to judge the practical significance and generalizability of a discovery. Researchers are called upon to think meta-analytically: looking at their results in a new way, thinking reflectively, and interpreting them in the global context of past studies.

This paper discusses the role of meta-analysis in the development of knowledge and the additional power of

meta-analytically examining confidence intervals for effects. The Exploratory Software for Confidence Intervals (ESCI), see www.psy.latrobe.edu.au/esci, is introduced as a means of synthesizing confidence intervals for effects from past research literature, the effect confidence interval for a present study, and the final pooling of a present study with prior research. By synthesizing effect sizes, and the CIs around them, past research findings reveal latent knowledge and theory that might never have been discovered if the studies had been considered individually. Although more than half of the research in a hypothetical study found no statistically significant effect, meta-analytic synthesis of effect sizes (and CIs around the effects) resulted in a different conclusion. This is the power of meta-analytic thinking: conflicting literature may yield a reasonable effect size, with remarkable precision, when examined meta-analytically. In addition, ESCI graphically reveals that the precision of an estimate grows from meta-analytic treatment of data. Confidence interval widths shrink as data is pooled, allowing a visual appreciation of precision.

hat is SERA about? It's about (not necessarily in this exact order): (1) serious scholarship; (2) having fun; (3) making friendships that can be renewed at each annual meeting; and (4) providing a safe and nurturing environment for students to learn and grow. At every annual meeting I have learned something new, including the recent 25th annual meeting in Austin.

We started small. In fact, one of our first meetings was in San Antonio in the same hotel where we will meet around Valentine's Day in 2003. Since then we have grown and done new things. Some of these developments include:

 Nine or so "one-night room scholarships" for rooms of students are paid directly to the conference hotel;

- these are given by random drawing during the Friday luncheon to students (a) staying in the hotel and (b) attending the SERA-subsidized luncheon;
- A student Outstanding Paper Award (with cash stipend!) is presented; and
- An AERA Outstanding Paper Award is made, and with SERA financial support (\$500), this paper is presented at AERA as part of the panel of Distinguished Papers from the various state and regional research associations.

In addition, our unofficial SERA one-person Entertainment Committee, Kathy Mittag from UTSA, usually comes up with an interesting music or dancing venue (or two or three) each evening.

The 25th annual meeting in Austin was one of our largest ever. However, we anticipate SERA 2003 "on the river" may be even bigger. Plan on attending in 2003, and bring a student or a colleague.

Better yet, bring 5 or 10!
