The planning for the 2010 Annual Meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana at the Hotel Monteleone 214 Rue Royale, New Orleans is well underway. An incredible number of diverse proposals have been submitted. In total, there were 309 proposals. The division chairs are ensuring that all proposals are receiving a fair review. The reviews and the Division Chairs' acceptance decisions will be made available at the end of October, and the draft program will be posted on the SERA webpage for review the first week in December.

We are very excited to have two training sessions being offered this year. The first is offered on Wednesday afternoon, which is the first day of the SERA annual meeting in New Orleans and is entitled "Quantitative Consultation for Researchers." During this session, **Robin Henson** (University of North Texas) will lead a panel of consultants, which include UNT professors **Darrell Hull, Kim Nimon**, and **Abbas Tashakkori**, and researchers will receive two hours of quantitative consultation that will enable them to apply knowledge learned to their own data set. The fee for the Wednesday session is \$30.

A second session begins on Friday afternoon and continues on Saturday morning. During the Friday afternoon session, **Tammi Vacha-Haase** and **Robin Henson** will provide an introduction to the measurement meta-analytic method called "Reliability Generalization". During the Saturday morning session, **Victor Willson** will provide a "Gentle Introduction to Meta-Analysis of Substantive Issues". The fee for the Friday/ Saturday session is \$60. Workshops will also be provided during the conference.

We are excited to have **Catherine Snow**, Henry Lee Shattuck Professor of Education from the **Harvard Graduate School of Education** and Past-President of the American Educational Research Association, as the 2010 SERA Presidential Invited Speaker. More information about Dr. Snow and the training sessions can be found in the newsletter. Graduate students will have an opportunity to participate in a Fireside Chat with **Catherine Snow**. This is an opportunity for informal interaction limited only to Graduate Students.

Graduate Students should also remember to get your Outstanding Student Paper Award submission to **Mary Margaret Capraro** no later than 5:00 pm January 11, 2010. The graduate paper award winner will be announced at the annual luncheon.

SERA 2010 Training Sessions

Wednesday Training: "Quantitative Consultation for Researchers"



Kicking off the 2010 SERA annual meeting in New Orleans, a panel of UNT professors will provide 2 hours of quantitative consultation for researchers. Participants will present specific research scenarios for the panel to consider. Partici-

Friday/Saturday Training: "Gentle Intro to Meta-Analysis"

The 2010 SERA annual meeting in New Orleans will close with a Friday afternoon/Saturday morning training session on meta-analytic techniques. A meta-analysis is a study of previous studies, rather than a study of people.



The **Friday afternoon** session will be an introduction to the measurement meta-analytic method called "Reliability Generalization" (RG), and will assume no previous training in conducting RG. RG studies

investigate (a) typical (e.g., mean, median) score reliability for a measure across studies, (b) how variable or stable score reliability for a measure is across studies, and (c) what design or sampling conditions predict variability in score reliability.

The "RG" meta-analysis training will be conducted by Tammi Vacha-Haase, *Colorado State University*, and Robin Henson, *University of North Texas*. **Tammi Vacha-Haase** invented "RG" in her seminal 1998 article in *Educational and Psychological Methods*. That article, and a companion article published in 2000, have been cited 129 and 124 times, respectively!!! **Robin Henson** also has published influential articles. For example, his 2001 article in *Measurement and Evaluation in Counsel*- pants will simultaneously learn about data analysis while applying the knowledge to their own datasets. Of course, participants may also elect to participate simply to listen to the dialog of the consultations, and need not have their own data. Led by **Robin Henson**, the panel includes professors **Qi Chen, Darrell Hull, Prathiba Natesan, Kim Nimon**, and **Abbas Tashakkori**.

ing and Development has been cited 200 times!!!

The **Saturday morning** session will be "A Gentle Introduction to Meta-Analysis of Substantive Issues" (e.g., whether or not "talk therapy" works in treating depression, whether or not smaller class sizes improve student achievement). Again, *no prior knowledge* of meta-analysis will be assumed in the Saturday morning introduction.



The Saturday morning metaanalysis session will be conducted by Victor Willson, *Texas A&M University.* Victor Willson was a Ph.D. student of Gene Glass, who most people credit as having invented metaanalysis, and popularizing

meta-analysis in his 1976 AERA presidential address. Victor is the author of 118 articles and author/editor of 5 books, including (with Glass and Gottman) The design and analysis of time-series experiments. He has served on numerous editorial boards, including <u>American Educational</u> <u>Research Journal, Learning and Individual Differences, Scientific Study of Reading, Reading</u> <u>Psychology, Reading Online, and Journal of Literacy Research</u>.

SERA 2010 Presidential Invited Address

Catherine Snow



The 2010 SERA Presidential Invited Address will be presented by **Catherine Snow**, Harvard Graduate School of Education. Her presentation is titled, "Classroom Discussion: Powerful, Engaging, and Rare." Cath-

erine will also meet in a scheduled informal "Fireside Chat" **limited only to Graduate Students**, to talk with students about whatever questions or interests they may have.

Catherine E. Snow is an educational psychologist who has contributed significantly to theories of bilingualism and language acquisition through parent-child interaction. More recently, Snow's research has focused on early childhood literacy, investigating linguistic and social factors that contribute to or detract from literacy. With Brian MacWhinney, Snow founded the Child Language Data Exchange System (CHILDES) database, a corpus of children's speech used by numerous language acquisition researchers. Snow is a Professor of Education in the Harvard Graduate School of Education and past president of the American Educational Research Association (2000-2001).

Dr. Snow is an expert on language and literacy development in children, focusing on how oral language skills are acquired and how they relate

Election News

I am pleased to announce the most diverse slate of potential candidates in SERA history. This year's nominating committee put forth an incredible slate. However, the committee's job is very difficult. To help the committee, please consider self nominating. It is really hard for the committee to predict who will or will not be interested in serving on the SERA Board. A great deal of time is spent checking to determine if potential candidates are interested. So to improve efficiency, self-nomination make someone's interest explicit to literacy outcomes. Snow has chaired two national panels: the National Academy of Sciences committee that prepared the report "Preventing Reading Difficulties in Young Children," and the Rand Reading Study Group that prepared "Reading for Understanding: Toward an R&D Program in Reading Comprehension." Her research activities include a longitudinal study of language and literacy skills among low-income children who have been followed for 15 years since age three; following the language development of young children participating in the Early Head Start intervention; studying the vocabulary development of first- and second-language learners; and considering aspects of transfer from first to second language in the domains of language and literacy. Her book, Preparing Our Teachers: Opportunities for Better Reading Instruction, is one of several efforts she is involved in to develop consensus among teacher-educators about what pre- and in-service elementary teachers need to know about language and literacy. Snow has also written about bilingualism and its relation to language policy issues such as bilingual education in the United States and in developing nations, and about testing policy. She is currently involved in efforts to improve middle-school literacy outcomes, in partnership with other Boston area researchers and the Boston Public Schools.

Book Reviews

Theoharis, G. (2009). The school leaders our children deserve: Seven keys to equity, social justice, and school reform. New York: Teachers College Press.

Using the work of actual principals, Theoharis provides an authentic view of the barriers and challenges faced by school leaders committed to a social justice-oriented agenda. The descriptions of what the principals achieved through their commitment, why they did it, what barriers they faced, and how they sustained themselves both personally and professionally provide a convincing account of both the costs and rewards of school leadership grounded in social justice. As a product of the analysis of the actions and words of the participating principals, Theoharis provides a framework for leadership that places social iustice leadership traits and consciousness at the core, surrounded by specific challenges, such as improving core teaching and curriculum and advancing inclusion.


Part of the appeal of the book is its unique description and definition of characteristics that resonate with any school leader who shares a

commitment to equity. One of the characteristics, resilience, receives an entire chapter of review and reflection as Theoharis examines how the principals within the study sustained themselves professionally and personally while they undertook the tasks connected with social justice leadership. Theoharis' succinct review of social justice literature, concrete examples of social justice leadership, and authentic consideration of the outcomes of social justice leadership afford current and future educators a lucid view of the processes involved in school reform focused on equity for all students.

Capraro, R. M., & Slough, S. W. (Eds.). (2008). *Project-based learning: An integrated science, technol-ogy, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) approach*. Rotterdam, The Netherlands: Sense.



The actual doing of Project-Based Learning (PBL) within STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) classrooms at the secondary level is the primary focus of this book. However, that does not explain why a group of faculty and graduate students here at Texas A&M University have gotten

involved in PBL. The authors of each chapter deeply and strongly believe that it is possible to have both equity and excellence in all of our K-12 schools, regardless of who the students are who attend these schools. By equity, they mean schools that do not have achievement gaps based on race, ethnicity, language or culture, ability, income level, or gender, and by excellence; they mean that virtually all children can reach high standards in STEM classrooms. Equity and excellence in ALL of our schools with ALL of our children is the book's vision and the reader's challenge. The authors hope that this book will provide the reader with some key tools for working on this dream. A companion book with teacher friendly PBL ideas and lessons will be published in 2010.
